Great Lakes are 20% of world's surface fresh water

- H for Lake Huron
- O for lake Ontario
- M for Lake Michigan
- E for Lake Erie
(so shallow it freezes)
- S for Lake Superior
(over 1,000 feet deep - so deep, that it could fill up all the other lakes with water left over!!!)



Canal

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Canals are man-made, artificial channels dug across narrow strips of land to connect 2 bodies of water making a shortcut for ship traffic.
- Famous canals are
 - Panama Canal (Panama)
 - Suez Canal (Egypt)
 - Erie Canal (New York)





Canal Lock

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

Lock is chamber built between 2 bodies of water of different levels; used for raising and lowering boats betw/ water of different levels

- Chamber with 2 gates-1 at each end
- Ships enter 1st gate; both gates closed
- Water is either added or taken away to match the new level of water
- 2nd gate opened; ship goes out at new water level
- All locks have:
 - watertight chamber
 - 2 gates
 - valve or a pump

Erie Canal

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- **Man-made** waterway in NY state.
- Runs 365 mi. from **Albany to Buffalo** at Lake Erie.
- Took eight years to build; completed in 1825
- **Connects the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes.**
- Barges pulled by draft animals, **cut transport costs by about 95%.**
- Population grew in western NY state.
- Ohio Valley and the Great Lakes swelled with people.
- **NY City become the chief US port.**
- **Still part of the NY State Canal System** today; bringing raw products in to Great Lakes; food grains and manufactured goods to eastern markets with diesel powered barges

 - automobile manufacturing
 - agricultural machinery
- **Technology – Inventions/advancements in science and industry:**
 - assembly line

Henry Ford

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Father was Irish farmer, mother was Belgian
- Worked on family farm (hated farming)
- Rebuilt pocket watches at 15
- Chief engineer for Edison Illuminating (encouraged by Thomas Edison to build cars)
- First auto company failed
- Henry Ford auto company was taken over by Henry Leland; Ford left company; Leland renamed it Cadillac
- Launched Ford Motor Company in 1903
- Ford cars won many races with Barney Oldfield as driver
- Introduced the Model T for \$825 in 1908
- Moving assembly line introduced in 1913 which dropped car price to \$360 in 1916
- Paid workers \$5 per day (double standard pay); considered high pay as part of sharing in the profits of the company
- Richest man on earth
- Hated Jews (Anti Semitic)
- Pacifist (Hated war), but made money off building B-24 bombers

The Genius of Henry Ford

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Build a basic automobile - no frills
- Cut manufacturing costs - assembly line
- Pay workers well - reduce turnover
- Lower price of each auto - priced for everyone
- Change American life - no more horses
- Did the same thing with farm tractors

Chrysler Corporation

Chrysler Corporation

- Global sales of \$373,679,000
- Produced 2,076,000 cars and trucks in 2007
- Employed about 273,000
- Lost \$2,920,000,000 in 2007
- Sales down 35% in 2008
- Brands:
 - Chrysler
 - Dodge
 - Jeep



Turn of the Century

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- **Technology explosion (A perfect storm)**
 - Internal combustion engine to power cars
 - Gasoline refineries - to fuel the cars
 - Vulcanized rubber for tires
 - Steel making process for parts
 - Electricity for lights
 - Electric motor to power factories
 - Interchangeable parts for assembly line
 - Assembly line for rapid production
 - Steam engine and railroad lines for shipping raw materials and distribution of finished cars
 - Henry Ford to put the pieces together

Daimler Buys Chrysler

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

1998 Daimler, a German car company that makes Mercedes Benz cars, bought Chrysler \$36 billion

2007, 9 years later, Chrysler was doing so badly that Daimler could not even sell it to anyone, so...

Daimler paid Cerberus, a US financial group, \$650 million just to take Chrysler off their hands.

How much did Daimler loose in 9 year?

How much did Chrysler receive in bailout money?

GM Down 53%

Ford Down 43%

Chrysler Down 44%

GM and Chrysler have rec'd 17.4 billion in
bailout money (taxpayer money) so far.

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Founded by Frenchman Antoine de la Mothe Cadillac in 1701.
- Nicknames - Motor City or Mo-Town
- Automobile capital of the world (Motor City)
 - Ford Motor Co.
 - General Motors Corp.
 - Chrysler Corp.
- Home of many black recording studios (Mo-Town)
- Home of United Auto Workers (UAW)
- Sports Teams: Detroit Lions, Detroit Tigers, Detroit Red Wings, Detroit Pistons

Chicago History

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Founded in 1833; 350 people
- 1st railway station 1838
- 1st sewage system in US in 1856
- Great Chicago Fire in 1871
- 1st great corporate retailers (Sears and Montgomery Ward)
- 1st skyscraper built in 1885
- World's Fair 1893
- Sears Tower was tallest in world when completed in 1974

Chicago

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Nickname The Windy City or Chi-town
- 3rd largest city in America; 2.8 million people
- Transportation center
 - Shipping- Lake Michigan, Mississippi River
 - Railroads- Hub between east and west coast
 - Air travel- O'Hare International Airport
- Economic center
 - Banking and insurance
 - Meat packing
 - Corp. home for large companies
- Cultural Center
 - Arts, ballet, Chicago Symphony, Jazz, and Theater
- Sports teams
 - Chicago Bulls, Chicago Blackhawks, Chicago Bears, Chicago Cubs, and Chicago Whitesox



Cleveland

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Founded in 1796 on the south shore of Lake Erie
- Major American manufacturing center. Steel and other manufactured goods were produced.
- Declining manufacturing hurt all Great Lakes states.
 - Region called the Rust Belt (rusting, empty factories).
 - Drop in population (more people leaving than moving in).
- Changing economy; Cleveland lands more corporate headquarters: American Greetings, Progressive Insurance, Eaton Corporation, Sherwin-Williams Company
- Home of Rock and Roll Hall of Fame
- Sports teams: Cleveland Indians, Cleveland Browns, Cleveland Cavaliers



Indianapolis Motor Speedway

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Founded in 1909 (100 years!)
- Nickname is The Brickyard
- First auto race held in 1911
- 2-1/2 mile rectangle
- Indy 500 held every May
- Total attendance is 400,000 (largest attendance of any sport)
- 2008 purse was \$14,406,580

W.K. Kellogg

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Discovered the wheat flake while running the Battle Creek, MI sanitarium with his brother, John.
 - Left wheat mixture for granola in cooker too long.
 - Sent through rollers anyway where each wheat berry became a separate flake.
 - Wanted to keep discovery a secret but his brother shared discovery with patients and guests.
 - C.W. was a guest who quickly made his own wheat flakes and called them Post Toasties.
 - Post Cereals is now General Foods.
- Kellogg changed the breakfast meal habits around the world.
- Made millions and gave away millions through his Kellogg Foundation.

Dairy Cows

Cooperation States and Regions Week 4

- Imported from Europe
- Produce 25 gal. of milk per day or 2,000 gal. per yr.
- Each cow is milked for about 4 years.
- Cow must be pregnant to produce milk.
- Cow has first calf at 2 years of age.
- Cows drink about a bathtub full of water and eat around 40 pounds of food a day.
- Dairy breeds:
 - Holstein 95%
 - Jersey 3.8%
 - Guernsey <1%
 - Ayrshire <1%
 - Brown Swiss <1%
 - Milking Shorthorn <1%
